23 **CONVENE THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE**

24 **Tab 1. Borg, Jacob (Endorsement of 20 Years Experience)**

25 Dr. Borg was present and was represented by his attorney Timothy Cerio, Esq.

26 Following discussion, Dr. Rafael Rivas-Vazquez moved to accept Dr. Borg's application for
27 licensure. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 2/0.

1 **Tab 2. Ducharme, Stanley (Endorsement of: Other State License; 20 Years Experience)**

2 Dr. Ducharme was present and was not represented by counsel.

3 Following discussion, Dr. Ducharme requested a break from the deliberations to contemplate
4 his course of action. The deliberations continued after the discussion of tab 6.

5 Following additional discussion, Dr. Rafael Rivas-Vazquez moved to approve Dr. Ducharme's
6 application for licensure based on the substantial equivalence of the 1979 Massachusetts
7 psychology laws and rules, to the laws and rules of Florida during that time. Dr. Harry Reiff
8 seconded the motion, which carried 2/0.

9 **Tab 3. Mascia, Cynthia (Endorsement of Other State License)**

10 Dr. Mascia was present and was represented by her attorney Stuart Christmas, Esq.

11 Following discussion, Dr. Rafael Rivas-Vazquez moved to approve Dr. Mascia's the application
12 for licensure based on the substantial equivalence of the 1984 Ohio psychology laws and rules, to
13 the laws and rules of Florida during that time. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the motion, which
14 carried 2/0.

15 **Tab 4. Mari, Lorraine (Endorsement of: Other State License; 20 Years Experience)**

16 Following discussion, Dr. Rafael Rivas-Vazquez moved to approve Dr. Mari's the application for
17 licensure based on the substantial equivalence of the 1988 New York psychology laws and
18 rules, to the laws and rules of Florida during that time. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the motion,
19 which carried 2/0.

20 **Tab 5. Scherbarth, Andrew J (Examination with Waiver)**

21 Following discussion, Dr. Rafael Rivas-Vazquez moved to accept Dr. Scherbarth's application
22 for licensure. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 2/0.

23 **Tab 6. Triolo, Santo J. (Endorsement of: Other State License; 20 Years Experience)**

24 Following discussion, Dr. Harry Reiff moved to deny Dr. Triolo's application for licensure by
25 endorsement of 20 years of licensed experience for failure to meet the education requirement of
26 § 490.003 F.S.; denial in regard to endorsement of other state license on the basis that the
27 educational and supervision requirement in the 1985 laws and rules of Georgia were
28 substantially dissimilar from the laws and rules of Florida during that time; and allow Dr. Triolo
29 the opportunity or withdraw his application within 14 days of the filing of the final order. Dr.
30 Rafael Rivas-Vazquez seconded the motion, which carried 2/0.

31 The meeting adjourned at approximately 9:30 a.m.

22 **MOTION FOR BOARD’S FINAL ORDER ADOPTING SETTLEMENT**

23 **Tab 1. Judith Strickland Sims, Case No. 2008-19315 (p/c/p Rafael Rivas-Vazquez,**
24 **Carol Webster, Herbert Goldstein)**

25 This case was withdrawn, prior to the meeting, due to the anticipated lack of quorum to
26 undertake consideration of the case. The case will be taken up at a future meeting of the
27 Board.

28 **PROSECUTOR’S REPORT**

29 **Tab 2. Laura Lopez, Esq.**

30 Ms. Lopez was not present, but submitted a report for the Board’s review prior to the meeting.
31 The Board reviewed the report outlining the current status of the forty-three (41) open
32 disciplinary cases, as of July 11, 2011.

33 Under legal review 21
34 Scheduled for probable cause review 9
35 Probable cause found 13

1 24 of the above cases are more than one year old. Dr. Luis Orta made a motion to continue
2 prosecuting the cases that are more than one year old. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the motion,
3 which carried 3/0.

4 **POST- DISCIPLINARY PROCEEDINGS**

5 **Tab 3. A. Norman Goldwasser, Case No. 2004-27669**

6 During the April 2009 meeting, Dr. Goldwasser was ordered to abide by the terms of his
7 settlement agreement, which includes the following:

- 8 • Payment of costs in the amount of \$5,780.56;
- 9 • Payment of fine in the amount of \$3,000;
- 10 • A signed and notarized psychology laws and rules affidavit; and
- 11 • Completion of twelve (12) hours of continuing education in the areas of record keeping,
12 and supervision.

13 Dr. Goldwasser asserts that he was involved in a serious car accident in June 2009, and
14 acquired an injury which has caused him to miss prolonged periods from work, and experience
15 financial hardships. Dr. Goldwasser requested a reduction in the fines assessed, and an
16 opportunity to enter into a payment plan.

17 Following discussion, Dr. Harry Reiff moved to deny the request for lack of medical
18 documentation, lack of documentation in regard to missing prolonged periods from work, and
19 lack of documentation in regard to financial hardship. Dr. Luis Orta seconded the motion, which
20 carried 3/0.

21 **Tab 4. Jerry Valente, Case No. 2009-07817**

22 During the January 2011 meeting, Dr. Valente was ordered to abide by the settlement
23 agreement which consisted of the following terms and conditions:

- 24 ▪ Reprimand;
- 25 ▪ Fine in the amount of \$2,500;
- 26 ▪ Costs in the amount of \$2,271.77;
- 27 ▪ 12 hours of continuing education, with a minimum of 3 hours in the area of record
28 keeping, 3 hours of ethics, and 6 hours in the area of conducting evaluations;
- 29 ▪ Probation for 6 months with the following terms and conditions of probation:
 - 30 ○ Indirect supervision, with review of 25% of patient records;
 - 31 ○ Appearance by Dr. Valente and his supervisor before the Board at the first
32 meeting following the commencement of the period of probation, and an
33 appearance at the last meeting of the Board prior to the termination of probation;
 - 34 ○ Dr. Valente and his supervisor are required to submit quarterly reports in affidavit
35 form during the period of probation;
 - 36 ○ Dr. Valente is also required to petition the Board to conclude probation.

37 Dr. Valente petitioned the Board for termination of probation.

38 Dr. Valente was present and accompanied by his supervisor Dr. JoAnne Hoza, and his attorney
39 Brian Coughlin, Esq.

1 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to grant termination of probation. Dr. Harry Reiff
2 seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

3 **ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEEDINGS**

4 **REQUEST TO TERMINATE TEMPORARY CONDITIONS ON LICENSE**

5 **Tab 5. David Steinbok**

6 During the October 1, 2010 full board quorum conference call, the Board determined to approve
7 Dr. Steinbok's application and place him on conditional licensure for 6 months. Under the
8 conditions of the Board's order, Dr. Steinbok would be indirectly supervised by a licensed
9 Florida psychologist, approved by the Board Chair, to ensure his understanding concerning the
10 proper handling of patient charts, paperwork and proper termination of patient services.

11 Dr. Steinbok completed the remaining requirements for licensure and the Chair approved Dr.
12 Larisa M. Palmer, PY 7753, to serve as his supervisor. Dr. Steinbok's conditional/active license
13 was issued on February 8, 2011. His term of supervision is scheduled to terminate on August 8,
14 2011.

15 Pursuant to the final order, the supervising psychologist is required to submit a final report
16 regarding the supervisory period, prior to termination of the supervision. The Board reviewed the
17 report, and determined whether the purpose of the supervision has been accomplished in order
18 to place Dr. Steinbok's license in a clear/active status.

19 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to lift the condition of indirect supervision and all
20 other conditions on the license. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

21 **EXEMPTION APPLICATION**

22 **Tab 6. Bernard Bulcourf**

23 Dr. Bulcourf was present and was accompanied by his attorney Cynthia A. Mikos, Esq. They
24 were both sworn in by the court reporter.

25 As a result of laws passed during the 2010 legislative session, the background screening and
26 hiring process for many health care and service providers regulated by a variety of state
27 agencies, including health care providers licensed by the Florida Department of Health, was
28 modified to require Level 2 back ground screening, effective August 1, 2010.

29 Previously health care and service providers underwent a Level 1 screening, which checked for
30 criminal history throughout the State of Florida. Level 2 background screening involves a
31 national search, and captures occurrences committed further back in time. A list of disqualifying
32 offences can be found in section 408.809 F.S. and 434.04 F.S.

33 Individuals employed or contracted with prior to August 1, 2010, and previously screened under
34 Level 1, are required to be re-screened under Level 2 prior to July 31, 2015.

35 A health care provider may not hire a new employee, contract with a person, or maintain the
36 employment of an individual until a final screening determination of "Eligible" has been made. If
37 the individual is "Not Eligible" he must be granted an Exemption from Disqualification from the

1 Agency for Health Care Administration, or the Department of Health, if the employment requires
2 professional licensure or certification through the Department.

3 Pursuant to section 435.07 F.S. a person is not eligible to apply for an exemption from
4 Disqualification until:

- 5 • He/she has been lawfully released from confinement, probation or other
6 sanction for a disqualifying misdemeanor criminal offense;
- 7 • At least 3 years after he/she has been lawfully released from confinement,
8 probation or other sanction for a disqualifying felony criminal offense.
- 9 • Persons designated as sexual predators, sexual offenders or career
10 offenders are not eligible for an Exemption from Disqualification.

11 If an individual licensed by the Department is eligible to apply for an Exemption from
12 Disqualification, the respective Boards will review the exemption applications and make
13 decisions as to whether to grant the exemption.

14 In order to receive an exemption from disqualification from employment, an individual has the
15 burden of setting forth clear and convincing evidence of rehabilitation, including, but not limited
16 to:

- 17 -the circumstances surrounding the criminal incident for which an exemption is
18 sought;
- 19 -the time period that has elapsed since the incident;
- 20 -the nature of the harm caused to the victim;
- 21 -and the history of the employee since the incident; or
- 22 -any other evidence or circumstances indicating that the employee will not
23 present a danger if employment or continued employment is allowed.

24 Dr. Bernard Bulcourf submitted an application for Exemption from Disqualification to maintain
25 employment in a health care setting pursuant to requirements of the Agency for Health Care
26 Administration. As a licensed psychologist, the exemption must be considered by the Board of
27 Psychology.

28 Dr. Bulcourf's initial application for psychology licensure was submitted on 1/23/02 and he was
29 licensed on 8/13/2002. The criminal charges were incurred prior his original date of licensure.
30 The charges were not listed on his application for licensure. No records were found where Dr.
31 Bernard Bulcourf reported such charges to the Department or Board.

32 Dr. Bulcourf's criminal history from the year 1988 indicates the following charges:
33 Knowingly, willfully, and with intent to defraud, pass and utter a falsely made and counterfeited
34 \$50.00 Federal Reserve Note in Violation of Title 18, USC, § 472. Dr. Bulcourf has completed
35 all sentences and probation.

36 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to grant the exemption. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the
37 motion, which carried 2/0. Dr. Rafael Rivas-Vazquez opposed.

1 Staff will submit a complaint to the Department's Consumer Services unit in regard to Dr.
2 Bulcourf's omission of his criminal history on his application for psychology licensure.

3 **PERSONAL APPEARANCE PURSUANT TO §456.013(3)(c), F.S.**

4 **Tab 7. Kenneth Cochran (Endorsement of 20 Years Experience)**

5 Dr. Cochran was present and was not represented by counsel.

6 During the April 2011 meeting, the Board requested a personal appearance by Dr. Cochran
7 pursuant to section 456.013(3)(c), F.S., to further explain previous unlicensed activity in the
8 State of New Jersey. The unlicensed activity occurred after the expiration of a temporary permit
9 on February 26, 1997. During that same period, Dr. Cochran was actively licensed as a
10 psychologist in the State of New York.

11 During the July 2011 meeting, Dr. Cochran provided an explanation for the oversight.
12 Additionally, Dr. Cochran reported to the Board that he had recently notified the New York
13 Board of Psychology of the infraction in New Jersey. The Board indicated that Dr. Cochran
14 should report any actions taken by the New York Board to the Florida Department of Health.

15 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to approve the application for licensure. Dr. Harry
16 Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

17 **Tab 8. Maxine Sadhi (Bifurcation/Examination)**

18 Dr. Sadhi was present and sworn in by the court reporter.

19 Dr. Sadhi was approved for licensure by examination in March 2009 and completed all
20 remaining requirements for licensure in October 2009. Prior to issuance of the license, Board
21 staff became aware of a complaint filed against Dr. Sadhi in her capacity as a mental health
22 counselor, licensed under Chapter 491 of the Florida Statutes.

23 On June 18, 2010, the Mental Health Counseling Board found probable cause regarding the
24 complaint; the public administrative complaint was filed with the Department on June 25, 2010.
25 Thereafter, the Board of Psychology Chair was notified, and a personal appearance was
26 requested of the applicant.

27 Dr. Sadhi appeared, as required, during the July 2010 meeting because the 491 Board case
28 was still pending resolution at that time. The Board required a second appearance from Dr.
29 Sadhi to take place after final action was taken by that Board, for review and deliberation of the
30 outcome. The license would continue to be held pending Dr. Sadhi's second appearance.

31 Subsequently the matter in regard to Dr. Sadhi in her capacity as a mental health counselor
32 was dismissed. The Department has provided a formal letter to confirm the current case status.

33 Dr. Sadhi has met all the requirements for psychology licensure and made an appearance as
34 requested by the Board Chair.

35 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to approve the application for licensure. Dr. Harry
36 Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

1 **RECONSIDERATION OF LICENSURE APPLICATION**

2 **Tab 9. Evelyn Harriott (Endorsement of Other State License)**

3 During the April 2011 meeting, the Board denied Dr. Harriott's application for licensure on the
4 basis that the educational requirement in the laws and rules of New Hampshire in 2008 were
5 substantially dissimilar from the laws and rules of Florida during that time. Dr. Harriott was given
6 the opportunity to withdraw her application within 14 days of the filing of the final order.
7 However, Dr. Harriott petitioned for reconsideration instead.

8 Following discussion, Dr. Harry Reiff moved to reconsider the application for licensure. Dr. Luis
9 Orta seconded the motion, which carried 2/0. Dr. Rafael Rivas-Vazquez opposed.

10 Following additional discussion Dr. Harry Reiff moved to uphold the credentials committee's
11 previous determination. Dr. Luis Orta seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

12 **Tab 10. Nicole Stewart (Examination)**

13 Dr. Stewart's application for licensure was approved by the Board via ratification of the October
14 24, 2008 APA applicant list. The application record reflects that Dr. Stewart was on active duty
15 with the U.S. Navy.

16 As per the requirements of Section 490.005(3)(a), Florida Statutes, Dr. Stewart's file was
17 scheduled to close on January 1, 2011 because she had not successfully completed the
18 national examination requirement for licensure. During the November 19, 2010 full Board
19 quorum conference call, the Board granted Dr. Stewart's request for a 12-month extension to
20 complete the outstanding requirements for licensure.

21 On December 20, 2010, the Department of Health's (DOH) Inspector General's Office received
22 an inquiry from the Naval Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS) seeking to authenticate two
23 letters, on DOH letterhead, provided to them by Dr. Stewart. One letter indicated that Dr.
24 Stewart had been issued a license. The second letter indicated that the license had been
25 issued in error. Both letters were ultimately found to be fraudulent. Records of this in regard to
26 the specific details surrounding this incident were provided to the Board to determine whether to
27 reconsider approval of Dr. Stewart's application for licensure.

28 Following discussion, Dr. Harry Reiff moved to reconsider the application for licensure in light of
29 a potential material change in the applicant's personal history. Dr. Luis Orta seconded the
30 motion, which carried 3/0.

31 Dr. Harry Reiff then moved to require a personal appearance from Dr. Stewart at either the
32 October 2011 or January 2012 meeting. Dr. Luis Orta seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

36 Dr. Luis Orta moved to accept the list of applicants. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the motion, which
37 carried 3/0.

1 **APPLICANT REQUESTS FOR EXTENSION PURSUANT TO §490.005(3)(b), F.S.**

2 **Tab 12. Ibis Brito**

3 Dr. Brito was present and sworn in by the court reporter.

4 Dr. Brito was previously granted a 6 month extension and petitioned for an additional extension
5 for the remainder of the 12 months allotted in the rule.

6 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta move to grant an additional 6 month extension. Dr. Harry
7 Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

8 Dr. Brito's extension will expire on January 1, 2012.

9 **Tab 13. Francine Odio**

10 Dr. Odio was previously granted a 6 month extension and petitioned for an additional extension
11 for the remainder of the 12 months allotted in the rule.

12 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta move to grant an additional 6 month extension. Dr. Rafael
13 Rivas-Vazquez seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

14 Dr. Odio's extension will expire on January 1, 2012.

15 **Tab 14. Moises Ramy**

16 Dr. Ramy requested an extension of time to complete the requirements for licensure.

17 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to grant a 12 month extension. Dr. Harry Reiff
18 seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

19 Dr. Ramy's extension will expire on July 15, 2012.

20 **Tab 15. Adriano Rojas**

21 Dr. Rojas was previously granted a 6 month extension and petitioned for an additional extension
22 for the remainder of the 12 months allotted in the rule.

23 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to grant an additional 6 month extension. Dr. Harry
24 Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

25 Dr. Rojas' extension will expire on January 1, 2012.

26 **Tab 16. Carmen Soto-Molinet**

27 Dr. Soto-Molinet was present, and was sworn in by the court reporter.

28 Dr. Soto-Molinet was previously granted a 6 month extension and petitioned for an additional
29 extension for the remainder of the 12 months allotted in the rule.

1 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta move to grant an additional 6 month extension. Dr. Harry
2 Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

3 Dr. Soto-Molinet's extension will expire on January 1, 2012.

19 Section 490.005(3)(a), F.S. provides that:

24 The Board reviewed the list of applicants whose files were scheduled for expiration prior to July

28 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to deny the application of Dr. Moreno-Chavez for
29 licensure by examination for failure to meet the statutory requirements for licensure within 24
30 months pursuant to 490.005(1)(d), F.S., and 490.005(3)(a), F.S., and allow the opportunity for
31 applicants to file a written request for withdraw of the application within 14 days of the filing of
32 the Notice of Intent to Deny. Dr. Harry Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

20 During the January 2011 meeting, the Board approved U.S. Journal Training's continuing
21 education providership application; however, the course submitted in conjunction with the
22 application was not approved citing the need for revisions to include content more specific to
23 psychologists. Further consideration of the course was tabled to the March 2011 full board
24 quorum conference call.

25 During the March 2011 meeting, the Board acknowledged the applicant's request for a waiver of
26 the 90-days for Board action on the application and indicated that it would allow the applicant
27 until January 2012 to make the requested revisions and submit the course for approval.

28 This matter was brought back before the Board to reverse the original action taken at the
29 January 2011 meeting. The providership application should not have been approved without
30 concurrent approval of the course, as is required in Rule 64B19-13.004, Florida Administrative
31 Code.

32 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved to reconsider the application for CE providership. Dr.
33 Harry Reiff seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

34 Dr. Luis Orta then moved to vacate the decision to approve provider status, and table the
35 ultimate decision in regard to approval of provider status and the corresponding revised course
36 until January 2012.

37 **PETITIONS FOR WAIVER OR VARIANCE**

38 **Tab 19. Karina Jeifez-Zagagi, re: 64B19-11.001 F.A.C., Examination**

1 Dr. Jeifez-Zagagi petitions for a waiver of rule 64B19-11.001 F.A.C., Examination, so that she
2 can proceed with the licensure process without having to re-take the laws and rules
3 examination. The rule provides that a passing score on the Florida laws and rules examination
4 shall cease to be valid eighteen (18) months after the Board's letter to the applicant advising of
5 same. Dr. Jeifez-Zagagi successfully completed the laws and rules examination requirement in
6 July 2009 and received the Board's letter advising of same on August 27, 2009; as per the rule,
7 the score expired on February 27, 2011.

8 Dr. Jeifez-Zagagi's application file was scheduled for closure on January 1, 2011, pursuant to
9 s.490.005 (3)(a), F.S. During the July 2010 meeting, Dr. Jeifez-Zagagi petitioned for, and was
10 granted, an extension of the amount of time allowed to complete the requirements for licensure.
11 The extension deadline is September 2012.

12 Dr. Jeifez-Zagagi plans to complete the supervised experience requirement on July 26, 2011;
13 and has successfully completed the national examination requirement.

14 Following discussion, Dr. Luis Orta moved the grant the petition and allow Dr. Jeifez-Zagagi's
15 passing score to remain valid for an additional 5 months past the expiration date. Dr. Harry Reiff
16 seconded the motion, which carried 3/0.

17 **PROPOSED LEGISLATION**

18
19 **Tab 20. Delegation of Professional Responsibilities or Activities by Licensed**
20 **Psychologists to Paraprofessionals**

21 During the June 2011 meeting the Subcommittee agreed to the following draft language.

22 **490.xxx**

- 23 (1) Definition. – As used in this section, “psychological assistant” means an individual not
24 otherwise licensed as a health care practitioner in a profession regulated under Section 456,
25 F.S., or certified by the state of Florida possessing as a minimum, a bachelors degree in
26 psychology a bachelor or masters degree in psychology, education or a health related field,
27 who receives training and supervision in various duties related to the practice of psychology
28 by a psychologist licensed pursuant to Chapter 490, F.S. A psychological assistant assists
29 with patient care, administrative, and managerial functions, and shall adhere to the same
30 ethical, legal, and practice standards as does a psychologist.
- 31 (2) A psychologist licensed pursuant to Chapter 490, F.S., shall ~~directly~~ supervise and be
32 responsible for all delegated acts performed by a psychological assistant under her or his
33 ~~direct~~ supervision.
- 34 (3) As used in this section ~~direct~~ supervision requires that the supervising psychologist shall
35 sufficiently monitor and be ~~reasonably~~ available whenever a psychological assistant is
36 performing any delegated duty listed in section (6).
- 37 (4) The supervising psychologist shall be available for emergency consultation and direction of
38 a psychological assistant, and for patient intervention and management.
- 39 (5) A psychologist licensed pursuant to Chapter 490, F.S., shall not delegate diagnostic
40 interviewing, diagnostic or forensic psychological determinations or treatment (or

1 psychotherapeutic) interventions to a psychological assistant, unless that psychological
2 assistant is also a psychology practicum student, psychology intern, or psychology resident.

3 (6) Before delegating duties to a psychological assistant, other than administrative and
4 managerial functions, the supervising psychologist must first complete a diagnostic
5 interview, or shall first review existing diagnostic records, of the service recipient in order to
6 determine the appropriateness of such delegation.

7 (7) Delegated duties include:

8 (a) gathering history and behavioral data, as long as such data does not involve clinical
9 judgments or clinical inferences

10 (b) administering and scoring those psychometric assessments selected by a psychologist

11 (c) implementing cognitive skills training as designed or prescribed by a psychologist

12 (d) implementing behavioral programs as designed or prescribed by a psychologist

13 (e) implementing biofeedback programs or relaxation training as designed or prescribed by
14 a psychologist.

15 (8) A psychological assistant shall not hold herself or himself out to the public as a
16 psychologist, or as independently providing psychological services.

17 (9) The Board shall establish by rule as it deems necessary a training and supervision
18 verification process for a psychological assistant, and shall establish by rule as it deems
19 necessary additional tasks clarifying, or adding to, the delegated duties listed in section (6).

20 (10) This section shall become effective on January 1, 20XX.

21 The subcommittee also considered providing an internet based survey on the Board website for
22 input and comments from interested parties. Staff was asked to continue the development of
23 the survey and presented the proposed survey questions to the Board along with the most
24 recent version of the proposed legislative language.

25 During the meeting, the Board was addressed by Dr. David Kazar, Licensed Psychologist, and
26 Dr. Carolyn Stimel, Florida Psychological Association (FPA), Director of Professional Affairs.

27 The Board aims to present the proposed legislative language to the legislature in 2013.
28 The FPA is encouraging of the idea of the survey and agreed to publish notice of the survey;
29 however, the FPA does not see legislation in this regard as a priority at this time.

30 The Legislative Subcommittee will meet within the next 45 days to finalize the survey questions.
31 The survey will be submitted for review by the full Board at the September Board Quorum
32 conference call. The survey approved by the Board will be provided to the Department's
33 Strategic Planning Services for implementation of the survey and preparation of a summary
34 report. The report of the data analysis will be used to finalize the draft language.

35 **RULES REVIEW AND/OR DEVELOPMENT**

36 **Tab 21. 64B19-18.007, F.A.C., Requirements for Forensic Psychological Evaluations** 37 **of Minors for the Purpose of Addressing Custody, Residence or Visitation** 38 **Disputes**

39 Previously, the Board discussed the fact that the "APA Guidelines for Child Custody Evaluations
40 in Divorce Proceedings" currently referenced in the rule have been superseded. It was agreed

1 upon that the former version (1994) which is referenced in the rule is more informative, and
2 direct.

3 During the April 2010 meeting, the Board decided to continue referring to the 1994 version of
4 the APA Guidelines for Child Custody Evaluations in Divorce Proceedings. The rule was
5 amended so that it no longer references the APA website, which now directs the user to the new
6 version of the APA guidelines.

7 A copy of the 1994 version of the guidelines, as well as a copy of the Specialty Guidelines for
8 Forensic Psychologists, was made available on the Board's website. Additionally, the website
9 address was incorporated into the rule: http://doh.state.fl.us/mqa/psychology/psy_statutes.html

10 During the October 2010 quorum call, the Board was addressed by Dr. Carolyn Stimel, Florida
11 Psychological Association (FPA) and Connie Galietti, J.D., FPA Executive Director, who raised
12 concerns about outdated language in the rule and possible conflicts, or confusion in regard to
13 Chapter 61 of the Florida Statutes.

14 Following discussion, the Board decided to withdraw the rule from the development process,
15 and continue to work on draft rule language.

16 During the January 2011 meeting, the Board agreed to table the issue to gather information
17 about laws in other states in regard to the role of psychologists in issues of child custody.

18 Chapter 61 of the Florida Statutes now refers to "parenting plans" instead of "custody" which is
19 the term used in 64B19-18.007, F.A.C.

20 The issue will be discussed during a future legislative subcommittee conference call. Board
21 staff was directed to include, for the upcoming meeting, material recently received on this topic
22 from Dr. Stephen Bloomfield, Licensed Psychologist and past member of the Board.
